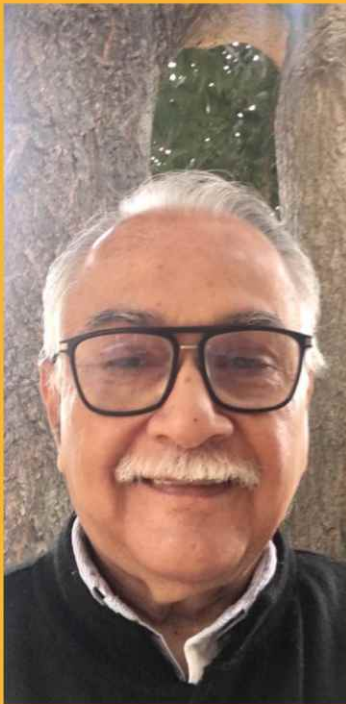


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# FROM THE HEAD AND THE HEART

Dear Friends,

I am happy to present the Annual Report of Aatapi, 2019-20.

Constant engagement with members of the “Samuday” has been Aatapi’s hallmark over the years. The Foundation reaffirmed its commitment to the four pillars of Sustainable Community Development – Women’s Empowerment and Economic Development, Health and Wellbeing, Inclusive and Holistic Education, and Water and Environment. Inclusion of Persons with Disability remained an integral part of all pillars.

The onset of Covid-19 has meant a paradigm shift in the manner in which Aatapi and its Stakeholders will foresee their engagement in the impending period, including both the present and the post Covid situation. It seems the entire outlook regarding agriculture, health, sanitation and hygiene perceived through the lens of sustenance shall undergo evident shifts. Aatapi envisages the boosting of need based opportunities for further medical interventions and to enhance its outreach to the doorsteps of poorest of the poor.

Identification and inclusion of the present migrant families within the ambit of stakeholders cocooned within an appropriate socio-economic engagement and a legal framework would be deemed vital. Aatapi’s trajectories have hitherto been net ‘importers’ of such migrants. It will, therefore be imperative to dovetail their interests. It will also continue investing in enterprises, having a shared vision by largely donning the role of a mentor. An increased emphasis on the nuances of capacity building would also be undertaken. Collective learning, for instance - of social distancing, wearing masks and sanitisation, usage of e-communications, e-learning and methods of e-businesses would have to be institutionalised. We foresee further opportunities with like minded CSR collaborators for promoting higher health awareness and for collective engagement with community based organisations for sustainable development.

Aatapi welcomed Dr. Nandini Srivastava as the new CEO, bringing with her more than 25 years of experience in the sector. We are sure, with her leadership, constant guidance from the Vibrant Board, and support from Collaborators, Aatapi will stride forward with greater resolve and impact.

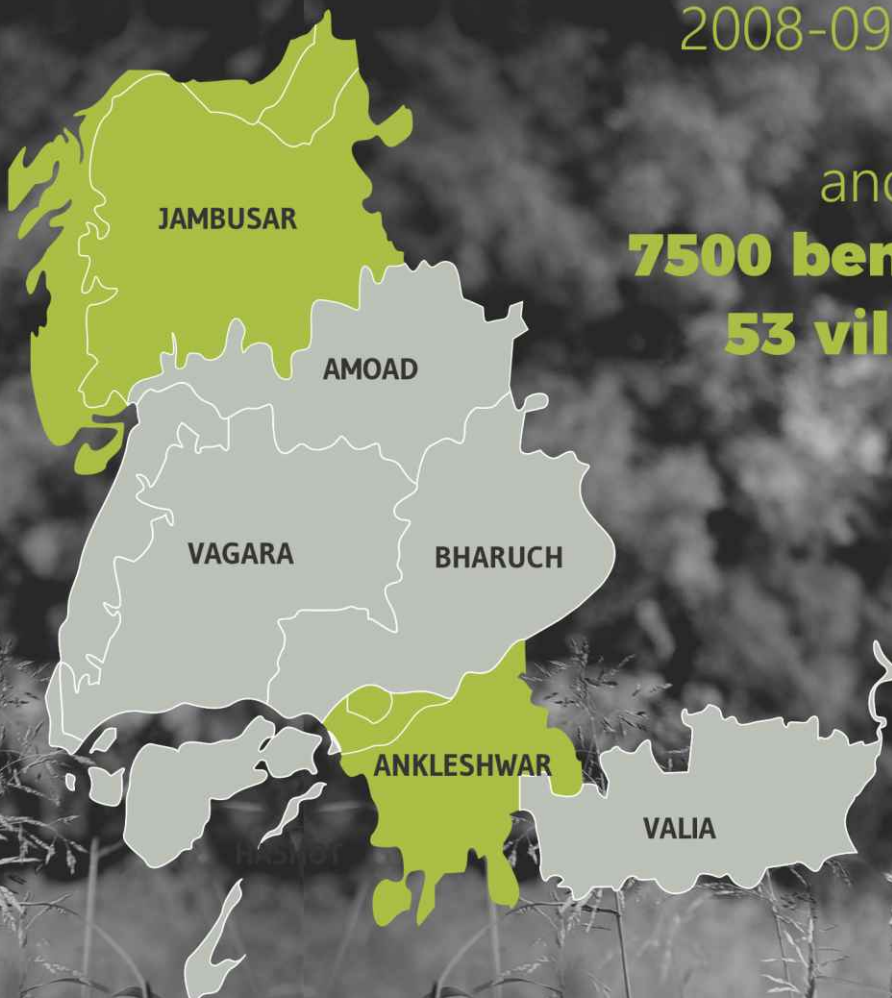

# 01 Livelihood and Economic Development



Approximately 90 % of the population in Jambusar and surrounding blocks are involved in farming to earn a living. Small-scale farming, raising livestock and non-farm activities are some of the common livelihoods that they survive on.

We engage with primary producers to build access to technological knowledge, maximize utilization of available resources, facilitate solutions of livelihood challenges, create and strengthen alternative sources of sustainable livelihood through engaging with individuals and community based organizations. The main objective to intervene in this sector is to increase the economic conditions of the small and marginalised farmers by creating newer opportunities for self employment, by delivering quality education and training, and to introduce a package of best practices appropriate for local soil and water conditions. We have intervened by tapping in their traditional sources of livelihood and by diversifying their livelihood portfolios by enabling them to collectivize and traverse the path of empowerment.

The Year 2019-20 was significant for Agriculture Development program as Vivekanand Khedut Mandali (FPO) strengthened its services for farmers through formal initiation of Sahiyaru Prayan Tool Bank, which was inaugurated by the DDO, Bharuch. The Input Centre at Vedach was activated and sub centres at Samoj and Uchhad were initiated.

Small and marginal farmers strengthened their access to resources in the form of agriculture input and technical knowledge with proactive initiative from Agriculture Technology Management Agency (ATMA), Central Soil Salinity Research Institute (CSSRI), Bharuch, Horticulture department, Bharuch, Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Chasvad, and Agriculture college, Bharuch, by wholeheartedly sharing the resources with the needy farmers.

This year also witnessed the adaptation of inter cropping and inter furrow irrigation practices

## Women Empowerment

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This year we could impact **2800+ socially and economically marginalized women from 25 villages**

We have facilitated the empowerment of women by promoting financial inclusion through microfinance and credit interventions via self-help groups. Binding to our values, our determined efforts to engage with socio-economically marginalized women such as single women and women with disabilities have helped them to improve their social status and economic independence.

Self Help Groups have created a space for practicing democratic values. Attending monthly meetings, saving regularly, voicing their opinions, taking decisions on loan allocations, liaison with banks, sharing ideas and experiences with other leaders at cluster levels, have opened vistas beyond the boundaries of their homes. We have facilitated them to take up loans under the Joint Liability Group scheme. An improved financial literacy has helped them to empower their livelihoods and their self confidence.

In the year 2019-20 we intently worked on strengthening UJAAS cooperative society, addressing the vulnerabilities it faced, tightening the governance system, enhancing the level of scrutiny on compliances and co-creating spaces for contributing to village development. Along with the Government audit of compliances, audit was conducted by an independent auditor from Janvikas appointed by Aatapi. For strengthening implementing systems, audit was conducted by Saath Charitable Trust.

Along with this, the year was invested in the engagement with CBOs, focusing on their responsibilities towards communities especially the health of women and holistic development of children, thus, reaching out to more than 2500 women. Women also started understanding the impact of drudgery that they faced during agricultural activities and the tools that could help in mitigating the same through learning trips and discussions.

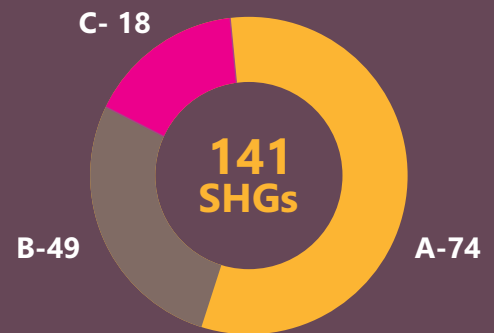

We strive to enhance the overall access to quality public health services across the villages of Jambusar Block. We intervene in the areas of the community's access to medical services, monitoring the quality of public health services, promoting the health and wellbeing of pregnant women, mothers, children under five, reproductive and health rights of adolescents and the differently abled through community monitoring and accountability. We look at this sector in a holistic framework, where physical, mental and social wellbeing are considered to attain an optimal state of health and wellbeing.

In 2019-20, we strengthened our engagement with CBOs on health and well being, undertook health and nutrition assessments for setting denominators in maternal and child health. 75 CBO leaders were oriented about maternal and child health issues. We created platforms for community to understand issues related to their health through the celebration of World Health Day, and health check ups of SHG members, pregnant women and adolescent girls. Health camps and organised campaigns with ICDS-Jambusar reached out to more than 2600 women and inculcated a concern for their own health issues. This was facilitated under the leadership of Ujaas and Arogya Sathis who were trained to lead the community processes.

We engaged with adolescents, including those with disabilities to address their sexual and reproductive health rights. This proved to be pivotal for enhancing orientation and accountability of youth towards health rights.

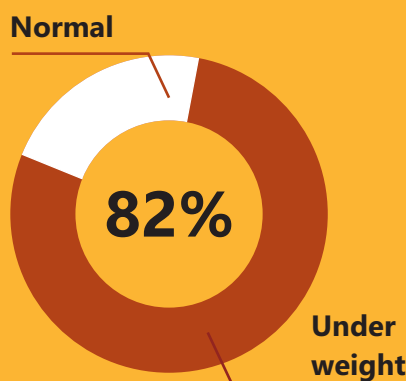

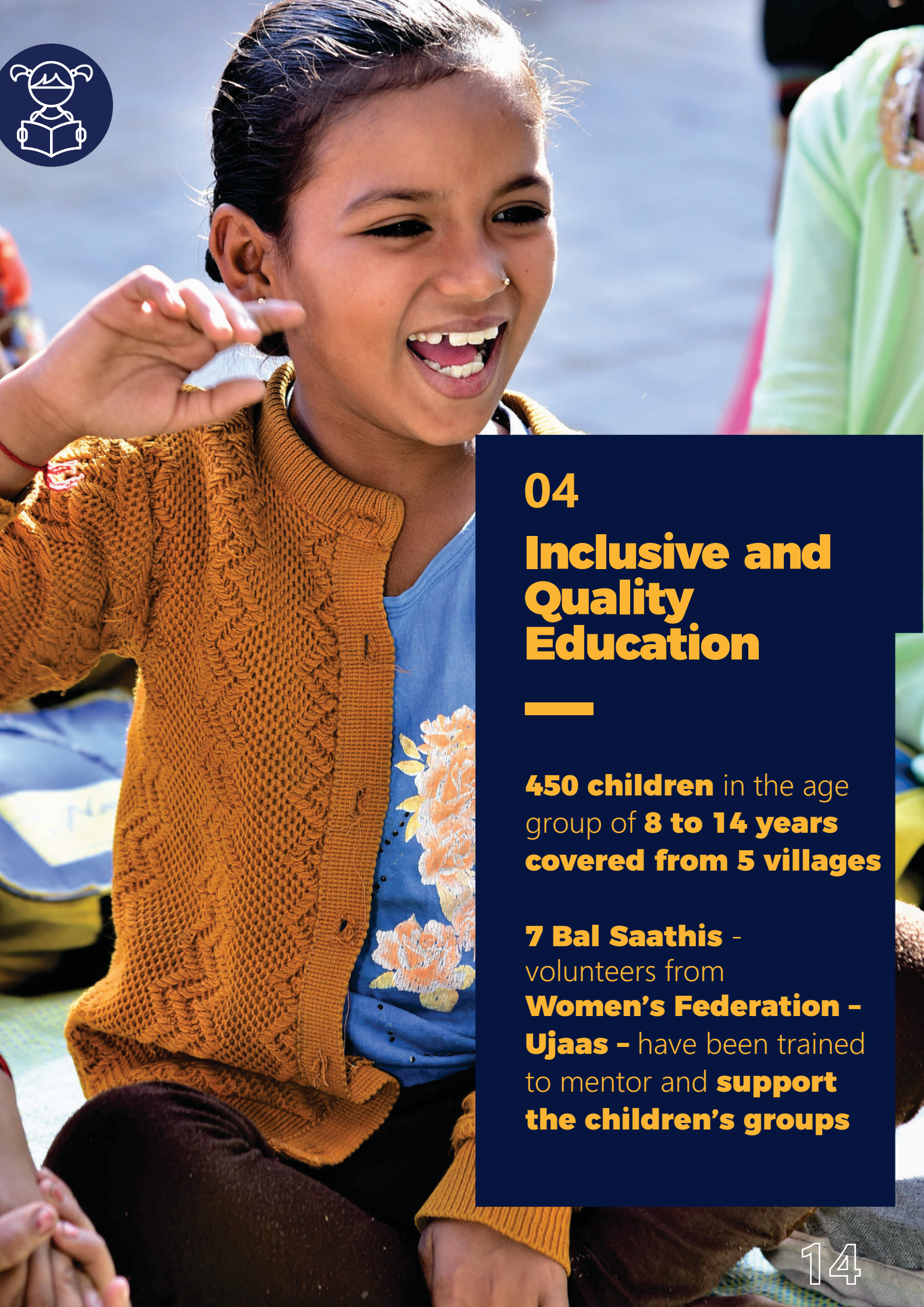

## **Inclusive and Quality Education**

We ensure holistic development of children (physical, emotional and educational) through developing soft skills, hard skills, values, and vocational training through promotion of accessible, appropriate and inclusive opportunities, community ownership and child participation.

We ensure that marginalized children, girls and differently-abled children get equal opportunities for participation.

The year 2019- 20 witnessed internal reviews and discussion with children, community based organizations, and experts to evolve a holistic child development program in sync with Aatapi’s over all mission. This gave shape to “Tejasvi Bal Vikas Karyakram” – focusing on holistic and inclusive education for children, along with nurturing leadership in children and giving them equal spaces to participate in the development processes. The program has an underlying strong belief that children are the transformers and transmitters of change.

The journey over the last few months has witnessed that children from all communities set their common space, which is non discriminatory, scientific and giving equal rights and opportunities to all children.

## 05 Inclusion

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This year we engaged with **1154 Persons** with **Disabilities** across **25 villages**

We nurtured the emerging leadership and facilitated the shift from beneficiary to Right holders from individual to collective rights. This led to the formation of the Viklang Parivartan Sangathan, a block level advocacy group of persons with disabilities.



We discovered that persons with disabilities are viewed as sufferers and dependent objects of care without autonomy. We supported them in accessing their entitlements by building linkages with Government departments and non-government institutions. This included procurement of disability certificates, bus passes, aids and appliances, scholarship for children with special needs and social security schemes. This simple step was the beginning of a journey to attain self-reliance.

The year 2019-20 paved way for putting in diligent effort towards promoting "INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES" in and around the work area of Aatapi. Thus, this year flagged off an annual inclusive sports event, "Sam Pahal". The other key milestones were the participation of PwD in Visioning Exercise of Aatapi, formation of inclusive Adolescent with Disabilities groups, initiation of "Bandish" musical group, that gave its first performance at Gandhi Ashram, Kareli on 26th January 2020.

# FOOTPRINTS TO FOLLOW



## A mother's way

### Bhavnaben's journey

Hailing from Uber village, she attended school till 9th grade and dreamt of giving her daughters the opportunities which she herself missed out. A member of the SHG since 2016. She started saving to fulfil her dream.

### Accessing her agencies

She accessed credit loan from Ujaas thrice, amounting to a total of Rs 43500. She used it productively by purchasing a buffalo, and for the education of her daughters.

### When dreams come true

Both her daughters are studying today, one pursuing PTC and the other studying in 12th grade. Today she saves upto Rs 1000 per month and deposits her savings for her daughters.

She shares, "I am proud I could teach my daughters , and I could be saved from vicious cycle of 10% interest rate."

## Shahina's resilience



### The determined young soul

Shahina hails from a conservative family from Dabha village which faced a strict lockdown because of COVID 19. However, her will was never affected by the circumstances and she reached out to the most needy pregnant women and identified the malnourished children for relief kit distribution.

### Shining her guiding light

She closely followed up with a young pregnant woman who was not aware of her pregnancy. As the woman faced challenges within her economic and social arenas, with no proper care or support, Shahina's proactive monitoring regarding her regular intake of iron folic and calcium has helped in improving her hemoglobin status and saved her life.

## **Kindling the latent ties**

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### **A shy lass hailing from Vedach**

Kinjal was initially cautious of her own movement, she would rarely talk to boys and would consider twice before spending time with them. She was apprehensive and scared in every sense.

### **Stoking the fire within**

Through Aatapi's TBVK she was able to join the Bal sena. She took part in the various children's activities organised and also assisted the leaders in including other kids to the group.

### **Looking at the rainbow's end**

Like Kinjal today many children, through the medium of games, activities and songs, are able to challenge the discrimination between the two sexes and have also tried to lessen the gap between them to establish a free channel of good thoughts, words and deeds.

## **Shamimben's story**

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Thirty Seven year old Shaminben lives in Kahanava village with her husband and four children. Her disability in walking and poor economic conditions never stopped her from being a dreamer.

### **A risk taking Entrepreneur**

She came to know of Aatapi, attended trainings and meetings, sought after her rights and entitlements and chased her dreams. She gave wings to her dreams by opening a laari of spices. She started selling her goods on floor and today she owns a small lake side laari in which she is the manager.

### **Pruning her wings to fly high**

Even though she faces challenges regarding a proper place for her lahari, she has found her voice in standing for what is right.

The present Program Director Chandrika Makawana is pursuing her 18 months post graduate diploma for Development Management from S P Jain Institute of Management and Research, Mumbai. She is widening her perspectives on Development which includes management of change, fund raising, social marketing and branding etc.

# RESPONSE TO NATURAL DISASTERS

Aatapi along with CBOs realized the importance of quick, organized, democratic response to disasters impacting communities and aimed to be the source of respite in times of turmoil.

Two such unprecedented natural disasters our area faced were floods, and the sudden advent of COVID-19 lockdowns. Both the instances required a quick response, which resulted in rapid relief operations.

## FLOOD RELIEF :

Rampant rains impacted many villages in the Jambusar block . For the flood relief, Aatapi and the CBO leaders reached out to nearly 450 needy families with food kits and cooked meal.



## COVID-19 RESPONSE :

When the entire nation was gripped in the fear of COVID-19 pandemic, we set our foot forth and initiated sharing the right information to community to address the fear and promote safety practices.

CBO leaders and Aatapi team proactively worked with block administration engaged intensively in the identification of the most marginalized, and reached 2000 families with ration and sanitation kits.

## Dharmishtaben's grit

### Becoming an Arogya Sathi, trained by Aatapi

As the leader of a Self-Help Group in a remote Village, Kahanva Banglawago, in Jambusar Block, she is a trained Community Health Volunteer.

### The spell of Corona

During the lockdown period, she continued to be in touch with pregnant women of residing in remote areas . She brought to the notice of the local health workers about the non-availability of Iron folic & calcium tablets for ANC women.

### Come Corona, thy will is not ours

As Mamta Diwas remained suspended till April, upon resumption in month of May, Dharmisthaben mobilized women in her area. Even though she received a communication through the ASHA worker that the same was cancelled she continued with awareness sessions with pregnant women who had gathered.



# THE INTERNSHIP PROFILE 2019-20

We had interns from The Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda - Faculty of Social Work, Department of Foods and Nutrition, Department of Extension & Communication, Navrachanara University, Parul University, Gujarat Vidyapeeth, Shree J.C Kumarappa Mahavidhyalay, Gadhda (Swa), Bharuch Agriculture College.

Students diligently conducted baseline of Anganwadis, Anthropometry, Dietary Practices, Knowledge of Supplementary Nutrition and Feeding Practices in villages. The EC students developed brochures for the CBOs.

A seven day rural camp was organised involving forty five students pursuing MHRM, two research scholars and one faculty from MSU, Baroda. Events were organised for the participants to closely communicate with the community.

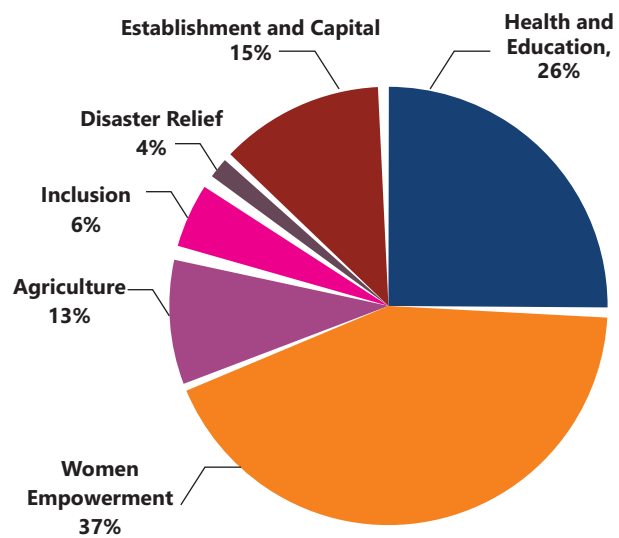

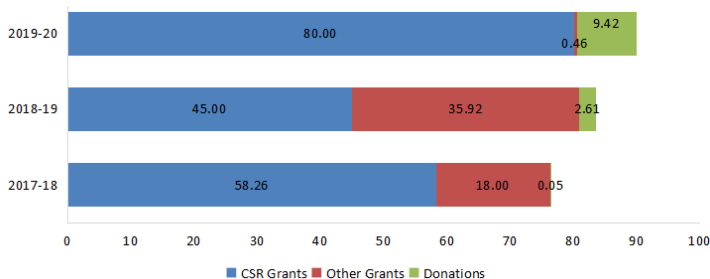

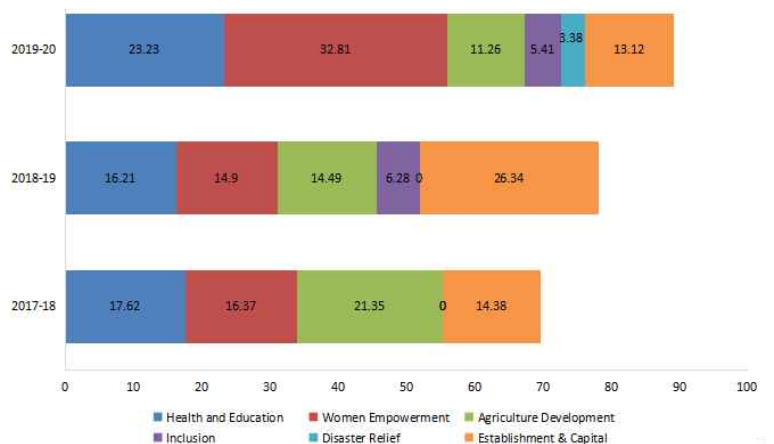
## Utilisation for 2019-20 (Total Rs. 89.20 Lakh)
